The 1<sup>st</sup> meeting of Teacher Education Appraisal Board (TEAB) for 2013-14 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (SE&L) was held on 21<sup>st</sup> May, 2012, at 1000 hours in the Conference Room, Central Secretariat Library, Shastri Bhavan, New Delhi to discuss the proposals received from the States of Assam, Gujarat, HP, Maharashtra, Mizoram, Rajasthan and Tripura for implementation of TE scheme for the financial year 2013-14.

2. Based on the discussions held, minutes have been prepared and placed below for approval, please.

- 3. It was clarified to the States that initially, due to paucity of funds, the States would be entitled for funds as per their requirement on the above heads. Later, depending on the availability of funds, at RE stage further releases could be made for requirement on other heads.
- 4. After the welcome address, AS (EE.I) made a brief presentation highlighting the following points:
  - States should prepare perspective Plan for 5 years as it is an opportune moment for the States to address the critical needs and quality improvement in teacher education through systemic overhaul.
  - Joint Review Mission Teams visited 10 States across the country and had made their recommendations, which can be seen on the website of the Ministry.
     Excellent recommendations have been made and States, which have not been visited by JRM Teams, should take the opportunity of going through these Reports and take appropriate steps for revamping TE in their respective states.
  - One of the important observations of the JRM Teams is that most of the States
    do not have a vision for TE and even today the teacher educators feels left out.
    Another important aspect is that a lot of the TE institutions have 50% or more
    vacancies; institutions like SCERT and DIETs do not have autonomy, wherever
    these institutions have been given autonomy they have excelled themselves.
  - SCERTs do not have resource materials in local languages, even though there is volume, there is no conceptual clarity and quality.
  - Even today, 11 States have not revised the curriculum as per NCFTE.
  - There should a constant review of the existing Teacher Education Institutions so as to weed out the unwanted and ineffective ones.

#### Rajasthan

5.1. Smt. Veenu Gupta, Principal Secretary, Government of Rajasthan made a presentation, highlights of which are as under:

#### 6. Gujarat

- 6.1. Smt. Sangeeta Singh, Principal Secretary, Primary Education, Government of Gujarat made a presentation, highlights of which are as under:
  - A sum of Rs.3393.24 lakhs was sough as financial assistance as committed liability for salaries. In addition a sum of Rs. 731.70 lakhs was sought for the Programmes and Activities.
  - Principal Secretary informed that necessary budgetary provision has been made for implementation of Teacher Education Scheme.
    - Principal Secretary also intimated that 3 DIETs would be established at, Nalanda and Danta. State Government also submitted the PWD estimates and requested for financial assistance of Rs.1600 lakhs for civil works.
- 6.2. After the presentation, following observations were made:

#### 7. Maharashtra

- 7.1. Shri Prakash Thube, Joint Secretary, Government of Maharashtra made a presentation, highlights of which, are as under:
  - The committed liability for salary component is Rs.2301.52 lakhs.
  - There is no committed liability for civil works.
  - The State Govt. has made a budget provision of Rs.15 crores as its share for implementing the teacher education scheme.
  - The State Govt. has carried out inspections of B.Ed colleges and based on the inspection, the State Govt. has identified 700 colleges for closure and is in the process of mooting proposal to NCTE for de-recognition of these 700 colleges.
  - Last year, all the vacant posts of Principals were filled up. This year, the State Govt. proposes to fill up the vacant posts of Lecturers and this is likely to be completed within three months.
  - Revised B.Ed curriculum would be completed by this year end.
    - As per the scheme, 48 posts needs to be created; whereas in Maharashtra the number of posts created is only 26 and consequently, only 32.95% of the academic posts are filled up as per the scheme. Hence, as per the norms of the scheme, there is a huge difference in the salary component between requirement and actual eligibility of salary.

- The State Govt. has made a budget provision of Rs.7.80 crores as its share for implementing the teacher education scheme.
- Action taken by the State Govt. on the JRM Recommendations in tabular form
  was submitted in a tabular form. As the Report in writing was received only
  recently, hence in a lot of issues, it has been indicated that action is being taken.
  The leader of JRM Team is scheduled to visit Mizoram next week and the action
  taken / proposed to be taken by the State would be discussed with the team
  leader in detail.
- As regarding separate cadre for Teacher Educators, the proposal has been placed before the Cabinet for its approval.
- As regards the vacant posts, this has still not been filled up due to some objections by the Finance Department. A meeting between the Departments of Personnel, Finance Department and the Education Department is scheduled to be held shortly for finalizing the issue so that the posts can be filled up expeditiously.
- Regarding financial assistance for civil works of DIETs and for BITEs, the State
  Government would submit a supplementary proposal as the PWD estimates
  submitted is as per the old SORs and these will be revised, as per the new
  SORs, for consideration of TEAB.
- 8.2. After the presentation, it was decided that the issue of salary for the posts of erstwhile 6 DRCs, which was up-graded to DIETs, needs to be considered by the Appraisal Team. The State Govt. was directed to re-work the requirement of funds for salary component, which would be taken on record and the salary component would accordingly be revised. Secondly, based on the filled up posts (due to posts of erstwhile DRCs being considered), the eligibility of financial assistance for Programme and Activities, which depend on posts filled, would accordingly be revised.
- 8.3. After discussion, financial assistance of Rs.3164.21 lakhs was approved for implementation of the TE scheme in the State of Mizoram, details of which is as follows.

#### 10. Assam

10.1. Shri-Hemanta-Nanzay, Commissioner & Secretary, Elementary Education, State Government of Assam, made a presentation, highlights of which are as under:

- There is a separate cadre of teacher educators for DIETs, CTEs, IASEs and SCERT.
- As per the guidelines of Teacher Education scheme, SCERT is proposed to be re-organized.
- · Out of 18 DIETs, in only 2 DIETs, the post of Principal, has been filled.
- 10,000 teachers have been trained in ODL mode and 28,000 teachers are proposed to be trained by Handique University.
- The State Government is developing a mechanism for monitoring of TEIs (on the spot and online) by initiating the works for development of a structured datebase covering all the TEIs.
- Steps have already been taken to encourage universities to review the B.Ed. curriculum in the light of NCFTE 2009.
- Steps being taken to develop resource materials for D.El.Ed. course for distribution amongst TEIs.
- Action is proposed to be taken for filling up promotional and existing vacant posts.
- In order to bring in fresh blood and new ideas, the State has proposed to fill up the vacant posts in DIETs through direct recruitment.

#### 10.2. After the presentation, following observations were made:

The State was advised to look into the report of NUEPA on the distant mode of training provided by IGNOU in respect of teachers of Bihar so as not to fall into the same trap, where the teachers of Bihar had undergone two years course on distant mode offered by IGNOU, and were found to be unfit and had to undergo refresher course for another six months.

#### 11. Tripura

- 11.1 Shri R.K. Chakrawarty, Director, School Education, Government of Tripura intimated that he had joined the post only recently and is not fully aware of the Teacher Education Scheme.
- 11.2 As the scrutiny of the proposal of the State Government has revealed that the proposal has not been submitted as per the Annual Work Plan format, the State Government was advised to resubmit the proposal as the per the Annual Work Plan format circulated. The representative was also informed that a specimen of the Annual Work Plan submitted by the State Government of Maharashtra has already been mailed to the Education Secretary of the State and the State can take cognizance of that Plan and resubmit their proposal accordingly.
- 11.3 The States were told that due to paucity of funds, the States would be entitled for funds as per their requirement on the above heads. Later, on in case of enhancement of funds at RE stage, and depending on the availability of funds, further releases would be made for requirement on other heads.
